2<sup>nd</sup> Reading – ORD 2024-08 – Consideration and Action on an Ordinance to Amend Portions of Chapter 62 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Snellville to Amend Inconsistencies and Allow Change in Fees by Resolution, to Repeal Conflicting Ordinances, and for Other Purposes [Bender]

### STATE OF GEORGIA

### ORDINANCE NO. 2024-08

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND PORTIONS OF CHAPTER 62 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF SNELLVILLE TO AMEND INCONSISTENCIES AND ALLOW CHANGE IN FEES BY RESOLUTION, TO REPEAL CONFLICTING ORDINANCES, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES

WHEREAS, the City of Snellville is in the process of updating its stormwater user fee schedule; and

WHEREAS, the City of Snellville has found an inconsistency in its ordinance that it would like to clear up; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and the Council of the City of Snellville, Georgia deems it in the best intertest of the safety and welfare for the citizens;

IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING AUTHORITY OF THE CITY OF SNELLVILLE, GEORGIA, and by the authority thereof:

### <u>Section 1.</u> Section 62-87, subsection (d) and (e) of the Code of Ordinances is hereby deleted in its entirety and replaced with the following:

- "(d) Subject to the exemptions provided for in section 62-92 and the credits provided for in section 62-93, the stormwater user fee, or any changes thereto, shall be established by adoption of a resolution of the mayor and council."
- <u>Section 2.</u> (a) It is hereby declared to be the intention of the Mayor and Council that all sections, paragraphs, sentences, clauses and phrases of this Ordinance are or were, upon their enactment, believed by the Mayor and Council to be fully valid, enforceable and constitutional.
- (b) It is hereby declared to be the intention of the Mayor and Council that, to the greatest extent allowed by law, each and every section, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance is severable from every other section, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance. It is hereby further declared to be the intention of the Mayor and Council that, to the greatest extent allowed by law, no section, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance is mutually dependent upon any other section, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance.

(c) In the event that any phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph or section of this Ordinance shall, for any reason whatsoever, be declared invalid, unconstitutional or otherwise unenforceable by the valid judgment or decree of any court of competent jurisdiction, it is the express intent of the Mayor and Council that such invalidity, unconstitutionality or unenforceability shall, to the greatest extent allowed by law, not render invalid, unconstitutional or otherwise unenforceable any of the remaining phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs or sections of the Ordinance and that, to the greatest extent allowed by law, all remaining phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs and sections of the Ordinance shall remain valid, constitutional, enforceable, and of full force and effect.

<u>Section 3.</u> All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby expressly repealed.

Section 4. This Ordinance was adopted 12, 2024. The effective date of this Ordinance shall be the date of adoption unless otherwise stated herein.

### STATE OF GEORGIA CITY OF SNELLVILLE

### RES 2024-14

WHEREAS, Stormwater control, monitoring and system maintenance has been a City government responsibility since legislatively mandated by federal and state government; and WHEREAS, the City of Snellville formed a stormwater utility to help defray the great cost of such mandate and set an initial fee for residential and commercial properties in 2008; and WHEREAS, only one fee increase occurred in 2016 while the number and the cost of needed system repairs has greatly increased as our stormwater infrastructure has aged and eroded over that time; and

WHEREAS, a Fee Study was conducted to assist the City with proposing a rate that will collect sufficient revenue to finance the expenses related to the operation and maintenance of the system; and

WHEREAS, it has become necessary to set new fees at a fair level that gives the City a reasonable opportunity to maintain our system, whereby the health, safety and welfare of our citizenry is protected.

NOW THEREFORE, be it ordained and resolved that a new stormwater utility fee structure is adopted as follows:

Tier 1 (Residential  $\leq$  2850 sq. ft.) = \$93.75

Tier 2 (Residential 2851-4750 sq. ft.) = \$125.00

Tier 3 (Residential > 4750 sq. ft.) = \$156.25

Commercial (All) = \$125.00 per 3800 sq. ft.
